But beyond serving as reliable havens for the underserved, essential hospitals stand among the nation's top research and teaching institutions. They innovate and advance best practices, generate better approaches to care quality and safety, and harness technology and other emerging tools to improve efficiency and outcomes.



These are today's essential hospitals: centers of quality and innovation for all who need care, regardless of social or economic circumstance.

Who Are Members of America's Essential Hospitals?

We represent more than 220 mostly urban hospitals across the United States. Many of our members operate large systems with multiple campuses and extensive ambulatory care networks. Others are more modest. But all share these fundamental characteristics of an essential hospital:

They care for the vulnerable, particularly the uninsured and Medicaid recipients, and

- train the next generation of clinicians;
- deliver comprehensive, coordinated care to communities;
- · provide specialized, lifesaving services, such as trauma and neonatal intensive care; and
- advance public and population health.

Patients of Essential Hospitals

Essential hospitals care for a richly diverse patient population. Greater than half of patients discharged by members of America's Essential Hospitals are racial or ethnic minorities, and, among them, they speak more than 100 languages. They face challenges, too: More than half are uninsured or Medicaid recipients, and they often are sicker and more complex than those served by other hospitals.
